GENERAL CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT

THE GENERAL CONDITIONS OF THE CONTRACT WILL FORM PART OF ALL BID DOCUMENTS AND MAY NOT BE AMENDED

- 1. Definitions
- 1. The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:
- 1.1 "Closing time" means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
- 1.2 "Contract" means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
- 1.3 "Contract price" means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
- 1.4 "Corrupt practice" means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of anything of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
- 1.5 "Countervailing duties" are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
- "Country of origin" means the place where the goods were mined, grown or produced or from which the services are supplied. Goods are produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components.
- 1.7 "Day" means calendar day.
- 1.8 "Delivery" means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
- 1.9 "Delivery ex stock" means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
- 1.10 "Delivery into consignees store or to his site" means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
- 1.11 "Dumping" occurs when a private enterprise abroad market its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the RSA.
- 1.12 "Force majeure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not foreseeable. Such events may include, but is not restricted to, acts of the purchaser in its sovereign capacity, wars or revolutions, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions and freight embargoes.

- 1.13 "Fraudulent practice" means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.
- 1.14 "GCC" means the General Conditions of Contract.
- 1.15 "Goods" means all of the equipment, machinery, and/or other materials that the supplier is required to supply to the purchaser under the contract.
- 1.16 "Imported content" means that portion of the bidding price represented by the cost of components, parts or materials which have been or are still to be imported (whether by the supplier or his subcontractors) and which costs are inclusive of the costs abroad, plus freight and other direct importation costs such as landing costs, dock dues, import duty, sales duty or other similar tax or duty at the South African place of entry as well as transportation and handling charges to the factory in the Republic where the supplies covered by the bid will be manufactured.
- 1.17 "Local content" means that portion of the bidding price which is not included in the imported content provided that local manufacture does take place.
- 1.18 "Manufacture" means the production of products in a factory using labour, materials, components and machinery and includes other related value-adding activities.
- 1.19 "Order" means an official written order issued for the supply of goods or works or the rendering of a service.
- 1.20 "Project site," where applicable, means the place indicated in bidding documents.
- 1.21 "Purchaser" means the organization purchasing the goods.
- 1.22 "Republic" means the Republic of South Africa.
- 1.23 "SCC" means the Special Conditions of Contract.
- "Services" means those functional services ancillaries to the supply of the goods, such as transportation and any other incidental services, such as installation, commissioning, provision of technical assistance, training, catering, gardening, security, maintenance and other such obligations of the supplier covered under the contract.
- 1.25 "Written" or "in writing" means handwritten in ink or any form of electronic or mechanical writing.

2. Application

- 2.1 These general conditions are applicable to all bids, contracts and orders including bids for functional and professional services, sales, hiring, letting and the granting or acquiring of rights, but excluding immovable property, unless otherwise indicated in the bidding documents.
- 2.2 Where applicable, special conditions of contract are also laid down to cover specific supplies, services or works.

		5.4	The supplier shall permit the purchaser to inspect the supplier's records relating to the performance of the supplier and to have them audited by auditors appointed by the purchaser, if so required by the purchaser.
6.	Patent rights	6.1	The supplier shall indemnify the purchaser against all third-party claims of infringement of patent, trademark, or industrial design rights arising from use of the goods or any part thereof by the purchaser.
7.	Performance security	7.1	Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the notification of contract award, the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the amount specified in the SCC.
		7.2	The proceeds of the performance security shall be payable to the purchaser as compensation for any loss resulting from the supplier's failure to complete his obligations under the contract.

- 7.3 The performance security shall be denominated in the currency of the contract, or in a freely convertible currency acceptable to the purchaser and shall be in one of the following forms:
 - (a) a bank guarantee or an irrevocable letter of credit issued by a reputable bank located in the purchaser's country or abroad, acceptable to the purchaser, in the form provided in the bidding documents or another form acceptable to the purchaser; or
 - (b) a cashier's or certified cheque
- 7.4 The performance security will be discharged by the purchaser and returned to the supplier not later than thirty (30) days following the date of completion of the supplier's performance obligations under the contract, including any warranty obligations, unless otherwise specified in the SCC.

8. Inspections, tests and analyses

- 8.1 All pre-bidding testing will be for the account of the bidder.
- 8.2 If it is a bid condition that supplies to be produced or services to be rendered should at any stage during production or execution or on completion be subject to inspection, the premises of the bidder or contractor shall be open, at all reasonable hours, for inspection by a representative of the Department or an organization acting on behalf of the Department.
- 8.3 If there are no inspection requirements indicated in the bidding documents and no mention is made in the contract, but during the contract period it is decided that inspections shall be carried out, the purchaser shall itself make the necessary arrangements, including payment arrangements with the testing authority concerned.
- 8.4 If the inspections, tests and analyses referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 show the supplies to be in accordance with the contract requirements, the cost of the inspections, tests and analyses shall be defrayed by the purchaser.
- 8.5 Where the supplies or services referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 do not comply with the contract requirements, irrespective of whether such supplies or services are accepted or not, the cost in connection with these inspections, tests or analyses shall be defrayed by the supplier.
- 8.6 Supplies and services which are referred to in clauses 8.2 and 8.3 and which do not comply with the contract requirements may be rejected.
- 8.7 Any contract supplies may on or after delivery be inspected, tested or analyzed and may be rejected if found not to comply with the requirements of the contract. Such rejected supplies shall be held at the cost and risk of the supplier who shall, when called upon, remove them immediately at his own cost and forthwith substitute them with supplies which do comply with the requirements of the contract. Failing such removal the rejected supplies shall be returned at the suppliers cost and risk. Should the supplier fail to provide the substitute supplies forthwith, the purchaser may, without giving the supplier further opportunity to substitute the rejected supplies, purchase such supplies as may be necessary at the expense of the supplier.
- 8.8 The provisions of clauses 8.4 to 8.7 shall not prejudice the right of the purchaser to cancel the contract on account of a breach of the conditions thereof, or to act in terms of Clause 23 of GCC.

9. Packing

The supplier shall provide such packing of the goods as is required to prevent their damage or deterioration during transit to their final destination, as indicated in the contract. The packing shall be sufficient to withstand, without limitation, rough handling during transit and exposure to extreme temperatures, salt and precipitation during transit, and open storage. Packing, case size and weights shall take into consideration, where appropriate, the remoteness of the goods' final destination and the absence of heavy handling facilities at all points in transit.

21. Delays in the supplier's performance

- 21.1 Delivery of the goods and performance of services shall be made by the supplier in accordance with the time schedule prescribed by the purchaser in the contract.
- 21.2 If at any time during performance of the contract, the supplier or its subcontractor(s) should encounter conditions impeding timely delivery of the goods and performance of services, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of the fact of the delay, its likely duration and its cause(s). As soon as practicable after receipt of the supplier's notice, the purchaser shall evaluate the situation and may at his discretion extend the supplier's time for performance, with or without the imposition of penalties, in which case the extension shall be ratified by the parties by amendment of contract.
- 21.3 No provision in a contract shall be deemed to prohibit the obtaining of supplies or services from a national department, provincial department, or a local authority.
- 21.4 The right is reserved to procure outside of the contract small quantities or to have minor essential services executed if an emergency arises, the supplier's point of supply is not situated at or near the place where the supplies are required, or the supplier's services are not readily available.
- 21.5 Except as provided under GCC Clause 25, a delay by the supplier in the performance of its delivery obligations shall render the supplier liable to the imposition of penalties, pursuant to GCC Clause 22, unless an extension of time is agreed upon pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2 without the application of penalties.
- 21.6 Upon any delay beyond the delivery period in the case of a supplies contract, the purchaser shall, without cancelling the contract, be entitled to purchase supplies of a similar quality and up to the same quantity in substitution of the goods not supplied in conformity with the contract and to return any goods delivered later at the supplier's expense and risk, or to cancel the contract and buy such goods as may be required to complete the contract and without prejudice to his other rights, be entitled to claim damages from the supplier.

22. Penalties

Subject to GCC Clause 25, if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods or to perform the services within the period(s) specified in the contract, the purchaser shall, without prejudice to its other remedies under the contract, deduct from the contract price, as a penalty, a sum calculated on the delivered price of the delayed goods or unperformed services using the current prime interest rate calculated for each day of the delay until actual delivery or performance. The purchaser may also consider termination of the contract pursuant to GCC Clause 23.

23. Termination for 23.1 default

22.1

The purchaser, without prejudice to any other remedy for breach of contract, by written notice of default sent to the supplier, may terminate this contract in whole or in part:

- (a) if the supplier fails to deliver any or all of the goods within the period(s) specified in the contract, or within any extension thereof granted by the purchaser pursuant to GCC Clause 21.2;
- (b) if the Supplier fails to perform any other obligation(s) under the contract; or
- (c) if the supplier, in the judgment of the purchaser, has engaged in corrupt or fraudulent practices in competing for or in executing the contract.

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- 23.2 In the event the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it deems appropriate, goods, works or services similar to those undelivered, and the supplier shall be liable to the purchaser for any excess costs for such similar goods, works or services. However, the supplier shall continue performance of the contract to the extent not terminated.
- 23.3 Where the purchaser terminates the contract in whole or in part, the purchaser may decide to impose a restriction penalty on the supplier by prohibiting such supplier from doing business with the public sector for a period not exceeding 10 years.
- 23.4 If a purchaser intends imposing a restriction on a supplier or any person associated with the supplier, the supplier will be allowed a time period of not more than fourteen (14) days to provide reasons why the envisaged restriction should not be imposed. Should the supplier fail to respond within the stipulated fourteen (14) days the purchaser may regard the intended penalty as not objected against and may impose it on the supplier.
- Any restriction imposed on any person by the Accounting Officer/Authority will, at the discretion of the Accounting Officer/Authority, also be applicable to any other enterprise or any partner, manager, director or other person who wholly or partly exercises or exercised or may exercise control over the enterprise of the first-mentioned person, and with which control over the first-mentioned person, and with which enterprise or person the first-mentioned person, is or was in the opinion of the Accounting Officer/Authority actively associated.
- 23.6 If a restriction is imposed, the purchaser must, within five (5) working days of such imposition, furnish the National Treasury, with the following information:
 - the name and address of the supplier and/or person restricted by the purchaser
 - (ii) the date of commencement of the restriction
 - (iii) the period of restriction; and
 - (iv) the reasons for the restriction

These details will be loaded in the National Treasury's central database of suppliers or persons prohibited from doing business with the public sector.

23.7 If a court of law convicts a person of an office as contemplated in sections 12 and 13 of the Prevention and Combating of Corrupt Activities Act, No 12 of 2004, the court may also rule that such person's name be endorsed on the Register for Tender Defaulters. When a person's name has been endorsed on the Register, the person will be prohibited from doing business with the public sector for a period not less than five years and not more than 10 years. The National Treasury is empowered to determine the period of restriction, and each case will be dealt with on its own merits. According to section 32 of the Act the Register must be open to the public. The Register can be perused on the National Treasury website.

24. Anti-dumping and countervailing duties and rights

25.1 Notwithstanding the provisions of GCC Clauses 22 and 23, the supplier shall not be liable for forfeiture of its performance security, damages, or termination for default if and to the extent that his delay in performance or other failure to perform his obligations under the contract is the result of an event of force majeure.

25.2 If a force majeure situation arises, the supplier shall promptly notify the purchaser in writing of such condition and the cause thereof. Unless otherwise directed by the purchaser in writing, the supplier shall continue to perform its obligations under the contract as far as is reasonably practical and shall seek all reasonable alternative means for performance not prevented by the force majeure event.

26. Termination for 26.1 **insolvency**

The purchaser may at any time terminate the contract by giving written notice to the supplier if the supplier becomes bankrupt or otherwise insolvent. In this event, termination will be without compensation to the supplier, provided that such termination will not prejudice or affect any right of action or remedy which has accrued or will accrue thereafter to the purchaser.

27. Settlement of Disputes

27.1

If any dispute or difference of any kind whatsoever arises between the purchaser and the supplier in connection with or arising out of the contract, the parties shall make every effort to resolve amicably such dispute or difference by mutual consultation.

- 27.2 If, after thirty (30) days, the parties have failed to resolve their dispute or difference by such mutual consultation, then either the purchaser or the supplier may give notice to the other party of his intention to commence with mediation. No mediation in respect of this matter may be commenced unless such notice is given to the other party.
- 27.3 Should it not be possible to settle a dispute by means of mediation, it may be settled in a South African court of law.
- 27.4 Mediation proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of procedure specified in the SCC.
- 27.5 Notwithstanding any reference to mediation and/or court proceedings herein,
 - (a) the parties shall continue to perform their respective obligations under the contract unless they otherwise agree; and
 - (b) the purchaser shall pay the supplier any monies due the supplier.

- 1. Bids submitted must be in line with the detailed specification. Failure to bid accordingly will result in the disqualification of the bids.
- 2. Bidders' attention is drawn to the fact that amendments to any of the Special Conditions will result in their bids being disqualified.
- 3. The NPA reserves the right;
 - 3.1. Not to appoint and/or cancel the bid at any time and shall not be bound to accept the lowest bid or proposal.
 - 3.2. To award a bid to one or more service providers.
 - 3.3. To award the bid as a whole or in part.
 - 3.4. To enter into negotiation with one or more bidders regarding any terms and conditions, including price(s), of a proposed contract before or after the conclusion of the contract. (BAFO "Best and Final Offer")
 - 3.5. To terminate any contract where service has not been carried out to its satisfaction.
 - 3.6. To amend any bid condition, validity period, or extend the closing date of bids.
 - 3.7. To cancel and/or terminate the bid process at any stage, including after the closing date and/or after presentations have been made, and/or after bids have been evaluated and/or after shortlisted bidders have been notified of their status.
 - 3.8. To conduct site inspections and or due diligence, or explanatory meetings in order to verify the nature and quality of services offered by the bidder. This will be done before/or after adjudication of the bid. The site inspection and or due diligence will be carried out with shortlisted bidders only.
- 4. The NPA may, at any time or times prior to the bid submission date, issue to the bidders any amendment, annexure or addendum to bid documents. No amendment, annexure or addendum will form part of the bid documents unless it is in writing and expressly stated that it shall form part of the bid document.
- 5. The NPA may request written clarification or further information regarding any aspect of this bid. The bidders must supply the requested information in writing within two (2) working days after the request has been made, otherwise the proposal may be disqualified.
- 6. As per National Treasury Instruction note no: 9 of 2017/18 bidders are required to register their companies on the government Central Supplier Database (CSD) and include in their bid a copy of their Master Registration Number (Supplier Number).
- 7. Bidders are required to provide tax compliance status PIN or the Central Supplier Database Master Registration Number (MAAA Number) to enable the NPA to view their tax profile and verify the bidder's tax compliance status.
- 8. Foreign suppliers with neither South African tax obligation nor history of doing business in South Africa must complete a pre-award questionnaire on the Standard Bidding Document 1 for their tax obligation categorisation.
- 9. In the case of Sub-contracting or joint venture agreement, the NPA will enter into a single contract with the principal service provider.
- 10. Any completion of bid documents in **pencil**, **correction fluid (Tippex) or erasable ink** will not be acceptable and will automatically disqualify the submitted bid.

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11. The NPA will not be liable for any expenses incurred by the bidders during the bidding process.

12. CONFLICT OF INTEREST, CORRUPTION AND FRAUD

- 12.1. The NPA reserves its right to disqualify any bidder who with or without their company / business, whether in respect of the NPA or any other government organ or entity and whether from the Republic of South Africa or otherwise ("Government Entity"),
 - 12.1.1. engages in any collusive tendering, anti-competitive conduct, or any other similar conduct, including but not limited to any collusion with any other Bidder or company / business in respect of the subject matter of this bid.
 - 12.1.2. seeks any assistance, other than assistance officially provided by a Government Entity, from any employee, advisor or other representative of a Government Entity in order to obtain any unlawful advantage in relation to procurement or services provided or to be provided to a Government Entity.
 - 12.1.3. makes or offers any gift, gratuity, anything of value or other inducement, whether lawful or unlawful, to any of the NPA's officers, directors, employees, advisors or other representatives.
 - 12.1.4. accepts anything of value or an inducement that would or may provide financial gain, advantage or benefit in relation to procurement or services provided or to be provided to a Government Entity.
 - 12.1.5. pays or agrees to pay to any person any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift or any other consideration, that is contingent upon or results from the award of any tender, contract, right or entitlement which is in any way related to procurement or the rendering of any services to a Government Entity.
 - 12.1.6. has, in the past engaged in any matter referred to in paragraphs 12.1.1 to 12.1.5.

13. INDEMNITY

13.1. If a Bidder breaches the conditions of this bid and, as a result of that breach, the NPA incurs costs or damages (including, without limitation, the cost of any investigations, procedural impairment, repetition of all or part of the bid process or enforcement of intellectual property rights / confidentiality obligations), then the Bidder indemnifies and holds the NPA harmless from any and all such costs which the NPA may incur and for any damages or losses the NPA may suffer.

14. PRECEDENCE

14.1. This document will prevail over any information provided during any briefing session whether oral or written, unless such written information provided, expressly amends this document by reference.

15. TAX COMPLIANCE

- 15.1. No award shall be made to a Bidder whose tax affairs are not in order. The NPA reserves the right to withdraw an award made to a Panel Member in the event that it is established that such Panel Member
 - 15.1.1. Was not compliant at the time of award
 - 15.1.2. does not remain tax compliant for the full term of the contract

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16. GOVERNING LAW

16.1. South African law governs this bid and the bid response process. The Bidder agrees to submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the South African courts in any dispute of any kind that may arise out of or in connection with the subject matter of this bid, the bid itself and all processes associated with the bid.

17. RESPONSIBILITY FOR COMPANY/BUSINESS PERSONNEL

- 17.1. A bidder is responsible for ensuring that its personnel (including agents, officers, directors, employees, advisors, and other representatives), comply with all terms and conditions of this bid.
- 17.2. Bidding companies must clearly indicate if they envisage sub-contracting part of the services. The specific goals of the company to which work will be sub-contracted must also be clearly indicated as per table 1 on page 38 of 45 of the SBD 6.1.
- 18. The NPA will enter into a Service Standard Agreement (SSA) with the successful bidder, effective from the date of panel approval, taking all aspects of the contract into account. The court order, the Administration of Estates Act and terms of the this bid as well as the SSA will provide guidance in the event there is any conflict in the meaning of those documents, the hierarchy/preference will be in that order of importance. Meaning the court order, Administration of Estates Act 66 of 1965, terms of the bid and lastly the SSA.
- 19. Under no circumstances will negotiation with any bidders constitute an award or promise / undertaking to award the contract.
- 20. The successful Curator will be subjected to a security screening process/ routine testing randomly by the NPA at any stage during the duration of this contract. If the results thereof are negative and/or unfavourable and/or have a material or adverse effect to the carrying out of this contract, NPA shall be entitled to cancel this contract immediately, in writing.
- 21. Bidders are requested to endorse their signature/initial on every page of the bid document. Furthermore, bidders must ensure that every place where a signature is required is correctly and fully signed including witnesses where applicable.
- 22. The Curator must have the infrastructure (physical premises) and the capacity to supply and/or deliver items/service required.
- 23. The Curator must supply and/or deliver the services as specified.
- 24. The Curator should perform his/her mandate in an effective, efficient, and professional manner.
- 25. The National Director of Public Prosecutions (NDPP) cannot be held liable for the actions of the Curator as no contract of employment exists between the Curator and the NPA or NDPP. A Curator is not appointed in terms of the provisions of the NPA Act or Public Service Act as the functions of the Curator are described in a court order issued by a High Court and the Administration of Estates Act 66 of 1965.

26. Litigation

- 26.1. Curator may with the prior written authorisation of the NPA engage the services of any attorney or counsel to perform the legal work specified in the authorization in relation to the curatorship: Provided that the Curator if he or she is unable to obtain the prior written authorisation of the NPA due to the urgency of the matter or any other reason, may with the prior written authorisation of the Master engage the services of any attorney or counsel to perform the legal work specified in the authorisation in relation to the curatorship;
- 26.2. The NPA may in its discretion not exercise its right to tax costs incurred under this provision by the taxing Master if the Curator has entered into any written agreement in terms of which the fees of any attorney or counsel will be determined in accordance with a specific tariff: Provided that no contingency fees agreement referred to in section 2 (1) of the Contingency Fees Act, 1997 (Act 66 of 1997), shall be entered into without the express prior written authorization of the NPA. Costs awarded against the Curator in legal proceedings, must be taxed by the taxing Master of the high court.

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26.2.1. **If-**

- a) the Curator has not entered into an agreement under paragraph 26(2); or
- b) there is any dispute as to the fees payable in terms of such an agreement,

the costs shall be taxed by the taxing Master of the High Court having jurisdiction or, where the costs are not subject to taxation by the said taxing Master, such costs shall be assessed by the Legal Practise Council, Law Society of South Africa or General Council of the Bar concerned or, where the counsel concerned is not a member of any bar council, by the body or person designated under section 5 (1) of the Contingency Fees Act, 1997.

- 26.3. No bill of costs based upon an agreement entered into under paragraph 26(2) shall be accepted as cost of the Curator, unless such bill is accompanied by a declaration under oath or affirmation by the Curator stating-
 - that he or she had been duly authorised by the NPA, as the case may be, to enter into such an agreement;
 - b) that any legal work specified in such bill has been performed to the best of his or her knowledge and belief;
 - c) that any disbursements specified in such bill have been made to the best of his or her knowledge and belief; and
 - d) that, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, the attorney or counsel concerned has not overreached him or her.
- 26.4. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in this provision, the Master may disallow Curator fees incurred under this provision if the Master is of the opinion that such fees are incorrect or improper or that the Curator acted in bad faith, negligently or unreasonably in incurring any such fees.
- 26.5. If the Curator has failed to discharge his/her duties or has discharged them in an unsatisfactory manner, the NPA may recommend to the Master to disallow any such fee either wholly or in-part.
- 27. The NPA may, in its sole discretion recommend one (1) or more successful bidders for appointment by the court as Curator or co-Curator.
- 28. The Curator must not have any criminal record. Convictions older than 10 years or pending disciplinary or criminal matters, as well as civil judgements against the individual must be disclosed.
- 29. A Curator on the panel will be required to sign a non-disclosure agreement prior to being provided with details regarding a case.
- 30. Bid proposal document should include the following detail but not be limited thereto in relation to the bidder:

 - 31.3.9. securities Services (capital markets),
 - 31.3.10. financial Advisory and Intermediary Services,
 - 31.3.11. law or litigation.

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- 31.4. Track record and experience in curatorship services and property management for instance asset forfeiture matters, insolvency and/or liquidations. The bidder must provide information that demonstrates/adequately prove specific and/or related experience and track record of the Curator(s) in curatorship services such as asset forfeiture matters, insolvency and/or liquidations. Such claims must be supported with at least three (3) or more references to permit the NPA to verify the claimed capabilities. To support all claims of experience presented and to assist the NPA in reviewing and evaluating the proposals, the bidders are requested to provide the following:
 - 31.4.1. At least three (3) **signed reference letters** of previous clients where similar services required by this tender were offered, listing the services received, indicating client's satisfaction with the Curator's delivery of the services, and the period of the contract i.e. Start and end date of contract as well as completing section 11 of this document. - 37. Costs categorised as disbursements are expenses incurred by the Curator out of the ordinary course of his business, and while performing his duties. Disbursements are for services that are normally sub-contracted and cannot reasonably be expected to be performed by the Curator. These expenses may in **EXCEPTIONAL** cases, and at the discretion of the NPA be paid on an ongoing basis upon request (also see par 39 below).

The following expenses are normally regarded as disbursements:

- 40. In general, the NPA will support an application for special fees on additional property identified by the Curator. The bidder must provide a price proposal on recommended special fee percentages in this regard (Also see par. 33).
- 41. The following factors are usually considered when taxing a special fee, but not limited to:

It also excludes property subsequently identified by the NPA in these cases the Curator should be informed in writing to ensure that there are no later disputes.
- 43. It must be made clear that the NPA cannot guarantee the fee it is still within the Master's discretion to grant a higher or lower fee.
- 44. Section 11 Declaration of good standing must be completed in full. **Failure to comply with this provision** will lead to immediate disqualification.

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SECTION 4

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SECTION 6

TERMS OF REFERENCE: THE APPOINTMENT OF A PANEL OF SERVICE PROVIDERS TO RENDER CURATORSHIP SERVICES IN ASSET FORFEITURE MATTERS TO THE NPA.

1. PURPOSE

1.1 The purpose of this bid is to appoint suitably qualified attorneys, advocates, accountants, auditors, legal or accounting firms and others in the related fields of commerce and law meeting the requirements to form part of a panel of Curators.

2. SCOPE OF WORK

Curators who qualify for appointment by the High Court who wish to be registered on the Panel of Curators should have the capacity and experience to exercise any powers as may be assigned to them by the Court. The Curator should inter alia:

- 2.1,1 Comply with the court order and any instructions given by the court as and when required.
- 2.1.2 Comply with NPA policies and directives.
- 2.1.3 Comply with the Prevention of Organised Crime Act, No. 121 of 1998 (POCA) and the Prevention of Organised Crime Regulations issued in terms of the Act.
- 2.1.4 Comply with the Administration of Estates Act 66 of 1965 in as far as applicable.
- 2.1.5 In terms of Section 32(2) of POCA, the Curator shall follow the Administration of Estates Act 66 of 1965 where POCA is silent.
- 2.1.6 Obtain letters of curatorship (Appointment letters) from the Master of High Court after he/she was appointed as such in a court order.
- 2.1.7 Account to the NPA as an interested party which is making recommendations to the Master as well as the Master of the High Court who is finally approving Curator accounts.
- 2.1.8 Obtain a bond of security for the value of property under his/her control as required by the Master for the duration of the curatorship.
- 2.1.9 Once a restraint or preservation order has been granted, the Curator is required to submit an interim report to the Master of the High Court and the Asset Forfeiture Unit within thirty (30) days or within such period as the Master of the High Court may allow. Included in the report there will be an inventory of property under the control of the Curator. Thereafter submit a quarterly status report of the property under the control of the Curator.
- 2.1.10 The Curator is obliged to ensure that he/she does not devalue the property by incurring unnecessary and unreasonable expenses which are personal to him/her such as expenses and disbursements which may be accruing to him/her. Such expenses would include travelling, accommodation, postages etc. especially when they are in high volume.
- 2.1.11 When a Curator is appointed by the High Court but fails to find security, the result is the Master would be prohibited from issuing a letter of curatorship, and such Curator shall not take care of /administer property. Acts carried out by such Curator are nullities.
- 2.1.12 When during the course of curatorship there is a movement (new property located or certain property released from the curatorship estate) in the value of the estate, the Curator shall accordingly revise the bond of security with the financial institution providing security. The Curator will account for the new bond of security value in his/her report to the Master.
- 2.1.13 Once all property of the estate has been administered, the bond of security must be reduced to zero, at which point the surety's obligations are likewise reduced to zero from the date confirmed by the Master.
- 2.1.14 As soon as a court order is made, in consultation with the representative of the NPA,
 - 2.1.14.1 determine the most cost-effective way of managing the property,
 - 2.1.14.2 determine compliance with the purpose of the curatorship,
 - 2.1.14.3 Determine any possible depreciation in its value.

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- 2.1.15 in consultation with all parties, consider what the best way is to secure the equity of property which are subject to a credit agreement for instance whether it should be released to the credit provider, realised early, stored, etc.
- 2.1.16 Consider whether it is more advantageous to store movable property or release them to the defendant or respondent, subject to a suitable agreement to preserve the value of the property concerned.

- 2.1.27 Submit to the Master the NPA's memorandum that recommends the approval of the account by the Master.
